REQUEST FOR AN INDEMNITY IN FAVOUR OF THE AIRWAYS CORPORATION OF NEW ZEALAND LIMITED UNDER SECTION 65ZD OF THE PUBLIC FINANCE ACT 1989

1. The purpose of this note is to request that you grant an indemnity in favour of the Airways Corporation of New Zealand Limited (Airways) under section 65ZD of the Public Finance Act 1989 for the Air Traffic Control Services Agreement for a period of one year (1 July 2024 – 30 June 2025).

2. Since Airways' formation as a State-Owned Enterprise on 1 April 1987, the New Zealand Defence Force (NZDF) and Airways have had an agreement for the provision of Air Traffic Services (ATS) within New Zealand's domestic and oceanic airspace. This agreement specifically includes the provision of an aerodrome control service for the Royal New Zealand Air Force's bases at Ohakea and Whenuapai and an approach and area control service for Ohakea.

3. The most recent Agreement (11912) with Airways commenced on 1 July 2013, was extended twice and finally expired on 30 June 2024. Airways and the NZDF wish to extend the Agreement for an additional year, to expire on 30 June 2025, to enable a new agreement to then be negotiated which aligns with Airways' pricing cycle. The extension will be undertaken by a Deed of Variation which will be effective from 1 July 2024.

4. The expired Agreement contained an indemnity which was separately granted by the Minister of Finance, by a Deed of Indemnity in 2013 on behalf of the NZDF, in favour of Airways for any legal liability for any loss or damage sustained by any third person (including the Crown in the widest sense) arising out of the provision by Airways of ATS to an NZDF aircraft while it is on a Military Operation (this term being defined in the contract). This also extended to approved foreign military aircraft in New Zealand while flying and using Airways' air traffic control services. The Deed of Indemnity granted by the Minister of Finance expired on 30 June 2024, and is unable to be extended by the NZDF entering into a variation of the contract to extend its term. The time delay in seeking this new indemnity has been caused by extended negotiations with Airways.

5. Since March 2024, the Prime Minister appointed the Minister of Defence to be responsible for the administration of section 65ZD of the Public Finance Act 1989 in relation to the following four categories of activity:

 participation of New Zealand Defence Force or Ministry of Defence personnel in operations, exercises, training and other activities with any other nation or an international body or bodies;

- acquisition by the New Zealand Defence Force or Ministry of Defence of military equipment and services from any other nation or an international body or bodies;
- c. acquisition by the New Zealand Defence Force or Ministry of Defence of military equipment and services essential for national security, operations and operational readiness; and
- d. tug, tow and pilotage of New Zealand Defence Force ships.

6. It is therefore requested that the Minister of Defence grant the new indemnity (enclosure 1) in relation to the agreement to extend the Airways contract under activity 4.c. above. This indemnity is required for the period of 1 July 2024 to 30 June 2025, because Airways is not insured for such risks. This is normal and has been required since Airways became a State-Owned Enterprise.

7. The indemnity states:

RNZAF Military Operation indemnity of Airways

Therefore in consideration of Airways agreeing to provide the NZDF with ATS, the NZ Government hereby agrees to indemnify Airways against any claim by any third person against Airways for any legal liability for any loss or damage sustained by any third person (including the Crown in the widest sense) which arises out of the provision by Airways of ATS to a NZDF aircraft while it is on a Military Operation (as defined in the Contract), except to the extent that Airways is liable for any:

- a. Such loss or damage arising out of a loss of separation between any aircraft not on a Military Operation and any NZDF aircraft on a Military Operation; or
- b. Such losses arising in connection with a Military Operation or other special military procedure in respect of which standards and procedures specific to the particular operation or procedure were agreed in writing by the parties in advance, to the extent that such loss or damage arises due to Airways breach of the Contract (including such specific standard and procedure) or negligence.

Other Considerations

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27. The deed of variation to formally extend the Agreement is yet to be signed by both parties pending Minister of Defence confirmation that the indemnity sought in favour of Airways Corporation will be granted.

28. It is noted that there has been some delay to requesting this indemnity which is in part due to prolonged negotiations with Airways Corporation.

Notification Requirements

29. The contingent liability created by the indemnity will potentially exceed \$10 million and therefore there is an obligation to notify the House of Representatives (Enclosure 2) in accordance with s.65ZD(3) of the indemnity and the reasons for it.

Recommendations

- 30. It is recommended that the Minister:
 - Note that the NZDF wishes to extend, by way of a Deed of Variation, a contract with Airways Corporation for air traffic control services to NZDF aircraft.

DEED OF INDEMNITY

THIS DEED is made on the day of

By THE SOVEREIGN IN RIGHT OF NEW ZEALAND acting by and through the Minister for Defence pursuant to section 65ZD of the Public Finance Act 1989 ("NZ Government") in favour of:

AIRWAYS CORPORATION OF NEW ZEALAND LIMITED (AIRWAYS)

BACKGROUND

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- A. The New Zealand Defence Force (NZDF) entered into a contract with Airways dated 28 June 2013 for the provision of Air Traffic Service (ATS) for a term of 11 years, which was subsequently extended for an additional year with a new expiry date of 30 June 2025 (the Contract). Airways has requested an indemnity for the extended period, in respect of certain liabilities.
- B. Under s.65ZC of the Public Finance Act 1989 the NZDF cannot grant the indemnity. Accordingly pursuant to s.65ZD of the Public Finance Act 1989, the NZ Government has agreed to indemnify Airways for any legal liability for any loss or damage sustained by any third person (include the Crown in the widest sense) which arises out of the provision by Airways of ATS to a NZDF aircraft while it is on a Military Operation (this term being defined in the Contract). This also extends to approved foreign military aircraft in New Zealand while flying and using Airways' ATS.

TERMS

- Therefore in consideration of Airways agreeing to provide the NZDF with ATS, the NZ Government hereby agrees to indemnify Airways against any claim by any third person against Airways for any legal liability for any loss or damage sustained by any third person (including the Crown in the widest sense) which arises out of the provision by Airways of ATS to a NZDF aircraft while it is on a Military Operation (as defined in the Contract), except to the extent that Airways is liable for any:
 - a. Such loss or damage arising out of a loss of separation between any aircraft not on a Military Operation and any NZDF aircraft on a Military Operation; or
 - b. such losses arising in connection with a Military Operation or other special military procedure in respect of which standards and procedures specific to the particular operation or procedure were agreed in writing by the parties in advance, to the extent that such loss or damage arises due to Airways breach of the Contract (including such specific standard and procedure) or negligence.
- 2. The NZ Government acknowledge that the definition of "NZDF" under the Contact includes armed forces of the countries, armed forces representing any group of countries and the United Nations, as further described in the definition of "NZDF" under clause 1.1 of the Contract. Accordingly, the NZ Government confirms that reference to the NZDF in Clause 1 of this Deed shall be reference to the NZDF as defined in the Contract.

3. The indemnity applies with effect from 01 July 2024 and expires when the Contract expires, being no later than 30 June 2025.

ACCEPTANCE AND WEAR OF UNITED STATES AWARDS FOR SERVICE IN IRAQ

Proposal

1. This submission proposes that you recommend to the Prime Minister that he seeks Her Excellency The Governor-General's retrospective approval for the acceptance and wear of United States awards by eight New Zealand Defence Force personnel for their meritorious service in Iraq in 2016 and from 2019 to 2023. A draft letter to the Prime Minister is enclosed for your signature.

Awards Offered and the Service Being Recognised

2. The Embassy of the United States in Wellington has formally offered United States military awards for eight New Zealand Defence Force personnel in recognition of their meritorious service in Iraq in 2016 and from 2019 to 2023. The names and roles of the recipients are listed in Annex A. Seven of these awards were presented in the operational theatre, with the eighth award presented in New Zealand. The 2016 award was to be included in the April 2023 request for acceptance and approval for wear but was left out due to administrative error.

3. The meritorious service of the individuals has not already been recognised by a New Zealand honour (the New Zealand General Service Medal 'Iraq 2015' and New Zealand Operational Service Medal have been awarded). The New Zealand Defence Force will not nominate any of these persons for New Zealand honours for this service.

4. Approval for the acceptance and wear of these United States military awards is requested under paragraph 10(a) of the 'Rules relating to the acceptance and wearing of Commonwealth, Foreign and international honours by New Zealand citizens', with many of the awards also meeting the requirements of paragraph 9(a)(iii) of the Rules. Paragraph 10(a) states that approval to accept and wear a Commonwealth or foreign honour may be contemplated where, in the opinion of the approving authority, such approval is in the best interests of New Zealand. Paragraph 9(a)(iii) relates to honours which recognise 'meritorious services on the part of a New Zealand citizen or member of the New Zealand Defence Force involved in operations while on exchange, attachment, interchange or loan duties with the armed forces of the country or international organisation making the proposal'.

5. Three of the offered awards for service in Iraq are to persons whose location of service was moved from Iraq to Kuwait, or vice versa, during their deployment but who were based for at least 30 days in Iraq. The changes of location were due to the operational requirements of the international military headquarters. A precedent decision was made in August 2023 approving the acceptance and wear of six awards where the service location was changed from Iraq to Kuwait or vice versa between 2019 and 2021. Thirty days or more of service in Iraq was considered by the then Minister of Defence, the then Prime Minister

and the Governor-General as an appropriate length of service to warrant acceptance and wear under the warlike operational theatre policy.

6. United States awards received by New Zealand Defence Force personnel whose service was based in Kuwait are not submitted for approval for acceptance and wear. This is because the service was not in a warzone or warlike operational theatre. Most Kuwait-based individuals spent between three and ten days on official tasks in Iraq during their six-month deployment. This length of service in Iraq is not considered long enough to justify acceptance and wear under the warlike operational theatre policy.

Precedents

7. Since 2016, 74 New Zealand Defence Force personnel have been given approval by various Governor-Generals (in 2016, 2018, 2021 and 2023) to accept and wear similar United States meritorious awards recognising their operational service in Iraq since 2014.

8. New Zealand and the United States enjoy a significant and long-standing defence relationship. The offer of these United States awards to New Zealand Defence Force personnel is an acknowledgment by the United States Government of the high value which is placed on the contribution made by New Zealanders to coalition operations in Iraq since 2016. The New Zealand Defence Force deployment to Iraq ended in 2023.

'C' Device for Combat Conditions

9. The 'C' device for Combat Conditions, which is worn on the ribbon of the medal, was awarded to the four personnel on the final two New Zealand Defence Force rotations into Iraq in the second half of 2022 and the first half of 2023. They are the only New Zealand Defence Force personnel who served in Iraq or Afghanistan to receive awards with a 'C' device. The award of this device was due to an administrative change in the second half of 2022 by the United States military related to the Combined Joint Task Force Operation Inherent Resolve forward headquarters in Baghdad. There was no difference in the roles and tasks undertaken by the personnel compared to previous rotations to the forward headquarters in Iraq since 2015.

Consultation

10. The Honours Unit, Cabinet Office and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade have been consulted and have no objection to the proposal.

Recommendation

11. It is recommended that the Minister:

a. **Invite** the Prime Minister to seek Her Excellency The Governor-General's approval for the acceptance and wear of these United States awards by the eight New Zealand Defence Force personnel listed in Annex A.

I seek your support, and Her Excellency The Governor-General's retrospective approval, for the acceptance and wear of United States awards by eight New Zealand Defence Force personnel for their meritorious service in Iraq in 2016 and from 2019 to 2023.

The Embassy of the United States in Wellington has formally offered United States military awards for eight New Zealand Defence Force personnel in recognition of their meritorious service in Iraq in 2016 and from 2019 to 2023. The names and roles of the recipients are listed in Annex A. Seven of these awards were presented in the operational theatre, with the eighth award presented in New Zealand. The 2016 award was to be included in the April 2023 request for acceptance and approval for wear but was left out due to administrative error.

The meritorious service of the individuals has not already been recognised by a New Zealand honour (the New Zealand General Service Medal 'Iraq 2015' and New Zealand Operational Service Medal have been awarded). The New Zealand Defence Force will not nominate any of these persons for New Zealand honours for this service.

Approval for the acceptance and wear of these United States military awards is requested under paragraph 10(a) of the 'Rules relating to the acceptance and wearing of Commonwealth, Foreign and international honours by New Zealand citizens', with many of the awards also meeting the requirements of paragraph 9(a)(iii) of the Rules. Paragraph 10(a) states that approval to accept and wear a Commonwealth or foreign honour may be contemplated where, in the opinion of the approving authority, such approval is in the best interests of New Zealand. Paragraph 9(a)(iii) relates to honours which recognise 'meritorious services on the part of a New Zealand citizen or member of the New Zealand Defence Force involved in operations while on exchange, attachment, interchange or loan duties with the armed forces of the country or international organisation making the proposal'.

Three of the offered awards for service in Iraq are to persons whose location of service was moved from Iraq to Kuwait, or vice versa, during their deployment but who were based for at least 30 days in Iraq. The changes of location were due to the operational requirements of the international military headquarters. A precedent decision was made in August 2023 approving the acceptance and wear of six awards where the service location was changed from Iraq to Kuwait or vice versa between 2019 and 2021. Thirty days or more of service in Iraq was considered by the then Minister of Defence, the then Prime Minister and the Governor-General as an appropriate length of service to warrant acceptance and wear under the warlike operational theatre policy.

United States awards received by New Zealand Defence Force personnel whose service was based in Kuwait are not submitted for approval for acceptance and wear. This is because the service was not in a warzone or warlike operational theatre. Most Kuwait-based individuals spent between three and ten days on official tasks in Iraq during their six month deployment. This length of service in Iraq is not considered long enough to justify acceptance and wear under the warlike operational theatre policy.

Since 2016, 74 New Zealand Defence Force personnel have been given approval by various Governor-Generals (in 2016, 2018, 2021 and 2023) to accept and wear similar United States meritorious awards recognising their operational service in Iraq since 2014.

New Zealand and the United States enjoy a significant and long-standing defence relationship. The offer of these United States awards to New Zealand Defence Force personnel is an acknowledgment by the United States Government of the high value which is placed on the contribution made by New Zealanders to coalition operations in Iraq since 2016. The New Zealand Defence Force deployment to Iraq ended in 2023.

The 'C' device for Combat Conditions, which is worn on the ribbon of the medal, was awarded to the four personnel on the final two New Zealand Defence Force rotations into Iraq in the second half of 2022 and the first half of 2023. They are the only New Zealand Defence Force personnel who served in Iraq or Afghanistan to receive awards with a 'C' device. The award of this device was due to an administrative change in the second half of 2022 by the United States military related to the Combined Joint Task Force Operation Inherent Resolve forward headquarters in Baghdad. There was no difference in the roles and tasks undertaken by the personnel compared to previous rotations to the forward headquarters in Iraq since 2015.

The Honours Unit, Cabinet Office and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade have been consulted and have no objection to the proposal.

I recommend that you invite Her Excellency The Governor-General to approve the acceptance and wear of these United States awards by the eight New Zealand Defence Force personnel listed in Annex A.
